### Elisabeth Wiedmer

July 14, 1924-February 19, 2020

Elisabeth Wiedmer died, age 95, in her Anchorage, Alaska home on February 19, 2020. Born July 14, 1924, in Spiez, Switzerland to Fritz and Anna (Barben) Schneider, Elisabeth spent her youth on the family farm with her older brother Kurt and younger sisters Annemarie and Idele.

She excelled at school and trained both in administration and nursing. Her relatives knew her as "Bohne," in Swill German short for "Bohnenstrange" or beanpole, as she was tall and slender. In 1950, Elisabeth emmigrated to the United States, settling first in Seattle with her uncle, Ernst Schneider. On December 21, 1950, she married Hans Wiedmer, also from Switzerland.

During early 1950's, Elisabeth and Hans lived in and near the Weyerhaeuser mill town of Snoqualmie Falls. In summer and fall, Elisabeth walked to area farms to help harvest fruits and vegetables. During this time, Elisabeth became a naturalized U.S. citizen. During the late 1950's and early 1960's, Hans' civil engineering work took Elisabeth to many remote towns across the western states. In 1964, they moved to Anchorage, where Hans worked on the White Alice Communications System.

In Anchorage, Elisabeth volunteered for several charities, including well-child clinics and at the Gilded Cage in support of the Aklaska Crippled Children's Association. She was also active with the Anchorage

Homemakers Association, in her gardens and was an excellent and enthusiastic chef.

In 1985, after Hans' sudden death, Elisabeth learned to drive, got her first driver's license and, with her friend, drove a 1971 Ford station wagon 4,500 miles from Anchorage to Walden, Vermont, where she and Hans had planned to retire. Elisabeth lived in Walden for 30 years, welcoming family and many friends, volunteering and staying active in the Walden Home Demonstration Group and gardening.

Elisabeth traveled to many foreign lands, enjoying local landscape, cultures and cuisines, but she always happily came back to the companionship of her birds, squirrels, chipmunks, racoons, skunks, bobacts, fishers, deer, bears and other wildlife. In 2015, she returned to Anchorage and the home she left in 1985, to live with her son and daughter-in-law, Michael and Gwyn.

At 92, she won her age group in the annual Hope Wagon Trail 5-K run. Retired from her racing career, she spent many wonderful hours at the Day Break Adult Day Center and Turnagain Social Club. Elisabeth is survived by her sister, Idele Stüder; brother-in-law, Fritz Waber; many nieces, nephews and cousins, all in Switzerland; and by Michael and Gwyn and their children and grandchildren.

Those of us in the Antique Auto Mushers, lucky enough to have personally known Elisabeth, remember her for the many activities (like Hope Weekendwhere we often celebrated her birthday—as well as, other tours and driveabouts.) We remember her cheerful presence, and we thank Mike for always sharing the gift of his mom's presence with us.
