I walked out to get the paper this morning and heard my first robin. They have been reported showing up here and there in our fair state—the first report by John Schandelmeier, nature commentator in the Anchorage Daily News, a couple of days ago. He says he saw one up north on the side of the Danali Highway.

Now, when you spot the first robin, it is a significant sighting, because it is a sure sign of spring here in the North Country, and it means car-driving season is upon us. For about seven months, we have had our rolling treasures tucked away in dry (even sometimes warm) stalls, waiting for our five months of fun. It goes without saying that we are ready to roll!

The off-season is usually something we all use to our advantage to make repairs and modifications, and—for me—those endeavors were almost overwhelming in number. I had four somewhat involved alterations on various vehicles, but those are fodder for another story or two. I figured, well, what else is a fellow to do when hiding indoors to avoid COVID-19? I certainly was not going to sit in front of the TV.

Somewhere in the midst of all the activity, I added 3-point seat belts in my 1938 Chrysler. Car seat belts were

practically—if not totally—unheard of in 1938, and I started about 10 years ago with lap belts, just after completing the restoration. As time went by, I began to think that the doorposts on a four-door sedan appeared to be a good, stout place to attach the shoulder strap; so I went about securing a captured nut to receive the bolt there to anchor the third point.

When all was said and done, it looks like the straps were meant to be there, and I'm sure they will add a modicum of safety, as well. —Tom
