Recovery will require about 3 weeks in the hospital after the surgery, plus significant rehab. If everything goes well, Bill will be able to return to near normal activities sometime in the future.

November 7, 2021–Addendum– Dear Diary:

Excellent show. Still can't stop the lyrics for "He Is an Englishman" from repeating over and over in my head.

Spent most of the day Sherlock Holmes hunting.

Being one of Arthur Conan Doyle's greatest admirers, I systematically searched the English capital for buildings and street addresses that played important roles in the Holmes canon. Geeky? I suppose . . . but great fun.



I located Montague Street, where Holmes lived early in his career, before he met and began his collaboration with Dr. Watson. It's rather hidden, tucked away behind the British Museum.

Later, after considerable searching, I was able to determine where, in the late nineteenth century, during the time of Holmes, the REAL 221b Baker Street would have been situated. It is not at all the location it occupies in the twenty-first century. Naturally, I was also able to detect the building from "The Adventure of the

Empty House," directly across from 221b. It was there that Col. Sebastian Moran, utilizing a state-of-the-art air powered rifle, pointed out its second floor window, fired a deadly head shot at Holmes as he sat in a chair by his window across the street. I hopped an intercity train early this morning, bound for the NEC (that's the UK's 'National Exposition Centre'), an absolutely ginormous exposition complex. Today was the first of two consecutive days I plan on spending there, attending one of the world's largest annual classic car shows. This is something that has been on my bucket list for decades. It's the English equivalent of our Hershey show, but held completely indoors.

It's a good thing that I scheduled two full days to take in this show, as I

was only able to cover about half of it today. The halls were packed with tens of thousands of car enthusiasts who have journeyed here from every corner of the globe.

I found hundreds of car makes and models represented, many so obscure and foreign that I suspect very few American car lovers have ever even heard of them. More than one hundred car clubs have booths alongside their vehicles. There was everything from Rolls Royces to kit



cars. I spotted cars from as early as the 1890's, as well as steam cars and antique electric vehicles. There were of itsy-bitsy bubble represented, like the Isetta, the Heinkle. the Trojan Messerschmidts. There were threewheeled cars like the Bond and the Robin Reliant. I even saw a rocket car (basically a huge Rolls Royce jet engine with four wheels under it). There were huge, mile-long European limousines and dozens of small British sports cars. Museum pieces barn finds. Vehicles and with nameplates hailing from just about every country in the world that has ever built a car.



And like at car shows on our side of the pond, there are gobs of booths selling wares of all kinds, targeting auto lovers. Automotive tools, parts, bodywork and painting supplies, memorabilia, hats, jackets and tshirts. You name it, it was there. Amongst my favorites were guys thick Cockney accents with demonstrating and hawking everything from miracle waxes to industrial strength super glues.

I must have taken five hundred pictures. But the best part of my visit was chatting with the different car club members. As soon as I identified myself as a Ford Model A enthusiast, or a Citroën 2cv owner, I was immediately welcomed, open-arms, into that club's fold. After displaying a photo of my fifty year old Volkswagen Squareback daily driver, or my 70 year old Buick Roadmaster on my phone, it seems I was instantly admitted into their families. Such is the power and allure of owning, loving, and caring for these venerable vehicles. A camaraderie that extends beyond nationality, language or politics.

It seems there is a lesson to be learned by associating with these clubs and their members. Perhaps this world would be a kinder, gentler, more understanding place if everybody drove old cars.

November 14, 2021 - Dear Diary:

Arrived by train this afternoon in the quaint town of Malvern, in the county of Worcestershire, which lies within the West Midlands region of England, approximately thirty miles from the Welsh border. Here I was met and welcomed by my second cousin Kim, her husband Chris as well as her son Alex, and daughter Lily. Cousin Kim, a doctor of psychology, retained her maiden name of Golding. We met rather accidentally online whilst each of us researching was our family's genealogy. A cyber relationship and authentic friendship ensued over the course of a year or so. Before then, other than my own three kids, I knew of no other relatives still living with my same last name.

Considering the circumstances governing our finding one another, and establishing a meeting, especially with someone I had never actually spoken to, our first contact went exceedingly well. "Brilliant" is how a Brit might put it. I spent the next few days in Malvern - somewhat confusingly pronounced (particularly to an American) by the locals as *mull-vin*. That pronunciation took a bit of getting used to, however, when in Rome . . .

November 15, 2021 - Dear Diary:

Cousins Kim and Chris, knowing of my love of old and classic cars, had arranged for the three of us to tour the Morgan sports car factory, which is located just down the road from their house.

Enclosed in a series of many old red-brick Victorian factory buildings, these wonderful automobiles have continuously been manufactured and assembled here for over a century, each and every one completely by hand. I have taken many automobile visited factory tours and museums around the world, but nothing I have ever seen before could prepare me for what I was to experience here. In a world of robotic assembly lines and computerized

mass production, the gentle art of English craftsmanship remains alive and well and is practiced every day, as it has been for over a hundred years, within these red-brick walls.



Morgan Factory and Showroom



I witnessed the creation of car bodies shaped and hammered out,

completely by hand, from flat sheets of aluminum. Frames and interiors all hand made. Seats being built and covered with specially leathers. Wood-grained dashboards and interiors created from raw cut lumber, and finished by the loving hands of journeymen that take their time, working with their hands and tools, many of which are as old as the factory. A single Morgan car, which is made to order, can take three months to complete. The factory traditionally vields somewhere between 900 to 1800 new cars per year.

Greatly prized, these vehicles are a great source of national pride. Their continuous manufacture is practiced daily in a little town with a tricky pronunciation, nestled in picturesque western hill country of England. Constructed with British pride of skill and expertise. A quality that sadly has gone the way of the skirt hoop and buggy whip throughout most of the rest of the world.
