We are salivating before we pass the entry gates. Who doesn't love a pork chop on a stick? Or fried peanut potatoes? Or crab cakes? Or turkey legs? Or funnel cakes? Or soft-serve pineapple ice cream? Who hasn't succumbed to the lure of the corn dog or the scent of curly fries?

Our taste buds tingle at fresh-squeezed lemonade and fried Oreos. We eat our dessert first with Dippin' Dots, Hawaiian shaved ice, cream puffs bigger than our heads, cookies and milk, or my personal favorite, peaches and cream.

Mongolian beef and cashew chicken; or pad thai and dumplings, all await the hungry fair-goer.

And because we can't eat another bite, but want the experience to last, we bring home zucchinis, Yukon Gold potatoes, and Talkeetna spinach bread, as well as lots of things not so good for us: cotton candy, kettle corn, elephant ears, and another personal favorite, caramel apples.

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

AAMA 60TH ANNIVERSARY

On a gray overcast Saturday, the AAMA filled the Alaska Aviation Museum with vivid color. On August 13th, eighty-one members and guests packed the banquet room to celebrate our club's sixty years.

After passing a newly painted "Burma Shave" signs, members parked their old cars in front of the Museum, then were greeted by a photo booth to record the momentous event. Appetizers were set out by our caterer, Sal's New York Grill, and guests had the opportunity to visit the Museum itself for an hour.

The tables sported bright red tablecloths and, instead of being numbered, were named for extinct American car brands. Instead of a floral arrangement, each table had a centerpiece of car books, old car parts, or car toys. There were "ice breaker" questions at each table to stimulate conversation. At each place setting was a commemorative glass for each guest to use, then take home.

The program began at six o'clock, when President Linda Mattes-Golding welcomed the participants. "It is fitting that we meet here at the Aviation Museum because many of the men who started the loose collaboration of old car enthusiasts (which later became the AAMA) were Air Force members serving at Elmendorf Air Force Base. It is also



fitting that we meet in the month of August, since the first official meeting of the Antique Auto Mushers of Alaska was held in August 1962, exactly sixty years ago".

Linda then introduced our Guests of Honor, Kurt and Paula Grau, who represented Kurt's parents, Leonard and Marguerite Grau, among the club's original founders. Len Grau had hoped to be with us, but passed away in late July of this year.

Finally, she introduced long-time member Marianne Robinson, who, with her husband Robbie, had provided the AAMA with a clubhouse above their garage. Marianne gave us the Invocation, which spoke of the camaraderie of our members in keeping our club so vibrant for so long. "We love our cars and we also love to eat together. Tonight we combine the two in this wonderful venue – a great way to ring in our seventh decade. May the food we are about to enjoy nourish our

bodies and enrich our spirits and may this evening's program inspire us to continue what is meaningful in our fellowship".

Art Isham called the table names, one by one, to the buffet dinner of garden salad, rolls and butter, Chicken Cordon Bleu, Garlic Infused Flank Steak, Fettucine Alfredo with Smoked Salmon, Rosemary Roasted Red Potatoes, and Ratatouille. model A odyssey: A Sequel (Part One of Two)

AZ to AK: our return. may~july 2021 by walt sonen

from the last episode, you may recall that we had put our model A pickup in storage in prescott, AZ, november 2019. a year ago in late may, we flew to tucson to revisit our friends there who graciously drove us to reclaim our ride. we rolled the A out into the alley between multitudinous units on 4 very low tires and, by golly, the old fella started right up! no rats! -could it have been my strategic placement of a year's supply of irish spring bar soap? a quick trip to the friendly NAPA store yielded a plug-in tire pump and we were mobile. after our tucson friends took off, we enjoyed a relaxing visit with my cousin there in prescott, after which we were on our way over a northerly winding road to jerome, a copper mining boom town of 100 years ago. it is nestled in the side of a mountain and was rejuvenated by the hippies of 50 years ago.

it was the 1st of june, it was in the 100° territory, HOT. i was finding that the A did not like the heat. this was to plague us throughout our journey home as summer 2021 set records throughout and in several places as we visited. it would be too repetitive to go on about the number of times we stopped to let the engine cool. we changed out the carburetor, condenser, distributor, wrapped foil and clothes pins around the gas line to address vapor lock. we never really found a cure. when we resumed travel it would seem better, but along the way several states later, i changed some of the various items back again. i know now that some of our troubles were vapor lock, but that didn't help much.

i should pause here to explain that we had a target date to be home for a wedding on the last day of july. and the month of august was set to reroof our house-long overdue-as i had materials

and a couple of guys lined up for the job. our southerly trek the summer/fall of 2019 was in two sections for good reason. we had flown home for two months to avoid the heat.

still driving north that 1st day, we came through sedona, flagstaff, and up into grand canyon nat'l park (south rim). "campgrounds are full." so we found a great little (commercial) spot that we had passed not far from the entrance. it was almost empty. up early, we reentered the park and had the place to ourselves for the first several hours. it is indeed grand! stopping by many overlooks to the east, we exited the park and spent some time at the marble canyon twin bridges which span the colorado river. and we stopped at nearby lee's ferry where i had embarked on a 21 day downriver raft/ camping trip some 10 years before. not too far along i replaced the antifreeze with water, removed the thermostat and front license plate. we camped alongside the road at a place called cliff dweller.

the next morning we climbed to 7000 feet to jacobs lake then through fredonia and into utah. we had a late breakfast at a killer corner cafe that we

had enjoyed 2 years before during our 5 day stay in kanob with hundreds of model A's that had come for a national club tour. we made 2~3 cooling stops that day which became the norm. enriching the fuel mixture was the only thing that i did which made a noticeable difference. we proceeded north to US 50 to "border" and stayed for the night. it's not really a town. the gas and motel are in UT and seamlessly in the same complex, the restaurant, bar, gift shop and casino are in NV. a cool, early start became the norm. we were headed west on route 50, the "loneliest road". yes, traffic is sparse. dry country but wonderful landscape and a number of 6~7000' passes which start from a floor of 4~5000', not a preferred truck route. we had a delightful stop at a museum in austin, NV, a pony express station during its short-lived operation, we were told that 10~15 miles apart. we made it most of the way across nevada that day and it wasn't uncommon for the riders to be 12~14 years old (120 lbs. max) and ride multiple horses changing at stations 10~15 miles apart.

we made it most of the way across nevada that day and stopped in fallon for the night.

we spent the next several days in minden, NV, visiting the wife of my recently deceased uncle walt. then west over the sierras on CA route 4 for another stay with jack and his wife, my H.S. pal, who had relocated to murphys, CA. my notes include rum from belize, cuban cigars, and banana omelettes my specialty (ask). we then wandered and raced (on unavoidable freeways) to our next plush stay with old seldovia friends in benicia on san francisco bay, clean sheets can be habit forming! we delayed our start for several days due to record heat. then on to CA coastal rt. 1 which was measurably cooler. except for the traffic, what a wonderful drive: the scenery, the road, the mom-and-pop type businesses. at some point i had noticed that the water pump had developed a minor leak, a concern.

at a filling station approaching fort bragg, an old guy (my age) engaged us in conversation. he was driving a honda insight. he had two. he also had two model A's. we followed him eventually to a dirt road leading to his homestead which, except for the climate, would have fit in many a backwoods location in alaska. he loaned me a (perhaps) serviceable water pump from several that he located in the myriad of his 50+years of various collections, fascinating stuff!



ft. bragg was in the midst of it's car show of the year. 130 cars, among which were 4 non-souped up model A's. one of the cars was a very cherry '31 roadster with 6K original miles. then literally through a redwood in leggett and then through the "avenue of the giants" the next day, after being misled by confusing signs indicating campgrounds leading us far astray, we camped at a motel in brookings, just inside the oregon line. a water pump was ordered to be delivered at a pal's place to the north.

one of the 'must stop' places the next day was port orford. for having fished our own salmon troller for many years, this is an interesting place. it is a port

without boat slips or a harbor to speak of. wooden boats needed very stout keels because they were launched and retrieved by a crane on the dock which protrudes into deeper water, the marina, if you will, is the large dock platform itself with each boat having its own wheeled cradle. these days fiberglass sport-type boats are dominant and did not seem to require such reinforcement. if there, we recommend 'griff's on the dock' for lunch. it was quite foggy along the oregon coat which is common. our old car got us into an otherwise full campground that night. this had happened before. if you drive an old car, you know.

Sunday morning August 6th dawned grey and windy. Several Club members made it to the park Strip before eight a.m. to help set up the overall event, as well as to erect the canopies for the AAMA.

Scott Hulse, David Jensen (who did not stay because of work commitments), Art and Tam Isham, Nat Gardner, Donn Reese, and Linda Mattes-Golding got the canopies upright and secure (no small feat in the brisk wind and sputtering rain), fortified by tent stakes, donuts, and coffee.

By ten o'clock, cars began arriving. Because of the weather, and perhaps because of the request for entry fees by MSSRA, the turnout was not as good as in previous years. At the entry ramp, the "fee" became a "donation," which seemed to please more attendees.

We set up our canopies away from the edge of the aisle, which was blocked by two Wiedmer vehicles: a 1953 REO F22B Civil Defense Rescue Service Truck, and their 1952 Chevy Stakebed, used to support the sound system loaned from Don and Karen Lederhos. One canopy sheltered the cooking and food area, while the other two canopies sheltered club members.

As expected, Model A's were well represented. The Godsoes showed their 1931 Pickup, and Valerie Bell drove her 1930 Sport Coupe. Dale Dryden's 1931 Taxicab made its usual splash, and new members Janice and Mike Czerwinski showed off their 1931 Victoria Tudor, while Marianne Robinson's 1930 Fordor Sedan got some TLC from Jim Fredenhagen who drove "Lily" his 1929 Tudor. The Alaskan A's added to the mix with the 1929 Opera Coupe owned by Frank Nosek, Terry Teilborg's 1929 Town Sedan, Brian Whitehead's 1930 Tudor Sedan, and the 1929 Town Sedan owned by Carlos.

Scott Hulse brought the 1930 International Harvester D2 and individually wrapped cookies from



Sheryl, while Nat Gardner's 1956 Ford Pickup was parked near the entryway. Nat was handing out dash plaques as cars arrived. Howard and Colleen Hanson drove their 1968 Dodge Pickup, while Brain Anderson and Ken Morton brought Jeeps - Brian's a 1979 Jeep CJ-7, and Ken's a 1993 Cherokee XJ.

Hot dogs were cooked and members shared salads and


desserts, and, wrapped up in coats hats and gloves, shared lots of good conversation.

AAMA pioneer Len Grau 1936-2022

Len Grau, the last surviving founder of the Antique Auto Mushers of Alaska, was born in Wasilla in 1936. His work for the FAA spanned 50 years.

In 1959 Len married his sweetheart, Marguerite. They were married 61 years, when Marguerite passed in 2020.

Len owned several Ford Model T's over the years, including a 1925 C Cab truck and a 1919 Speedster. However, his favorite vehicle, as per his son, Kurt, was his 1932 Packard.

Len was considered to be a master gardener, and was quite active in the Alaska Pioneers Igloo 15.





Len is survived by his son Kurt, daughter-in-law Paula, and grand-daughter Gretchen.

A celebration of Len Grau's life will be held at 2:00 pm on Saturday, September 10th at the Farm Loop Christian Center, 5900 Loop Road in Palmer.
