

A Very Unique Model T

It was bizarre, something you wouldn't expect to see, contrary to Henry's famous color scheme: ". . . any color, as long as it's black." But there it was. It appeared in the late 1970's, and through the early 1980's, it persisted at the Park Strip (Jay Ofsthun) show, AAMA's traditional Alaska Sales Rondy show and finally at our Northway Mall show, where I first laid eyes on it in 1987. It was the fluorescent, metal-fleck pink Model T Ford.

When I first saw it, I had not yet joined the Antique Auto Mushers. I had acquired my own 1925 Model T in 1984, I was just finishing the restoration and I was unsure how to install the upholstery. I had a kit to replace my car's top and seats in the original style, but I needed the details, especially for the top and how it attached to the windshield. The Pink car had beautiful diamond-tufted white leather seats, which were far from stock, and it had no top. I was impressed with the pink paint and the upholstery, and the wheel spokes that were not the original hickory, but appeared to be cherry. This was not what I needed, but I never quite forgot the

Fast forward to about a month ago, when the pink car surfaced again among the collection of then current owner, Kurt Rein. Kurt was downsizing and sold it to Kurt Grau, son of the late AAMA member, Len Grau.

"It is a 1923 Model T (so it is 100 years old this year!). My dad bought the car on May 3, 1982, from John Monaco, here in Anchorage. I was 11 years old at the time, and I remember him coming to pick me up at school in the car, and my friends all said that my dad was there in line with all the other parents, with a sparkly, pink, old car. I didn't believe them, but of course, it turned out to be true. It was the first historic car that he bought to keep here in Alaska, with several more to come over the years. He loved driving it in parades, for musical events, weddings, etc..."

Chalon goes on to report that, "John Monaco was the person who had done the entire restoration of the car from top to bottom, just prior to my dad purchasing it from him. I don't know if John is still around, but I remember him doing another restoration of a really nice old white truck,

with wood in the bed as well, after the Model T."

Kurt stored the T for many years, and it was badly in need of repairs. Chalon goes on to say that, "Unfortunately, sometime around the late 1980's or early 1990's (I don't really remember anymore), the car received some vandalism, and it sat in my dad's garage, unrepaired ever since."

Now we know a bit more about the outlandish, pink Model T, and since it has the renewed interest through AAMA member and new owner, Kurt Grau, we may see it again someday. Maybe Kurt Grau will preserve the unforgettable, candy apple pink glow that some of us remember. Whichever way he goes with his restoration, this car will be quite a conversation piece and a tangible reference to our club's past. Go for it, Kurt!


