But they were all forthcoming with advice (which is free), and they all had their own opinions on what kind, size, and brand of snow blower I should purchase. After commiserating with several of them, I found them all to be full of , er . . . recommendations.

I also discovered a sort of close-knit fraternity, perhaps best described as a 'true brotherhood' of these snow blowers. They are guys that I have known for

decades. Some of them close friends. All members of some niche clandestine following.

Who knew?

There are also the salesmen at the hardware stores. Each and every one of them passionate about snow blowers. Each with varied and totally unique advice regarding gas versus electric, and self-propelled versus push-behind. I shan't even attempt to broach the topics of swipe width or snow height, let alone single vs. double vs. triple staged augers. My head was about to explode with information overload and the varied opinions that were continuously being cast my way.

But 4400 square feet is a lot of asphalt. That haughty number stuck in the back of my head and occupied my thoughts for days. It kept me up night after night. Gas engines, I am told, were laborsome. They needed fuel drained and fouled spark plugs replaced, and were

We had the road all to ourselves and many of us drove to its end in Kantishna.
