

# Rondy Gets Cold Wind and Snow

Since 1961, one of the main events of the Antique Auto Mushers has been the Greater Anchorage, Inc. Fur Rendezvous Grand Parade.

This year it was held on February 24, and the club fielded ten cars plus three others providing rides for dignitaries of the Pioneers of Alaska: Royalty from Anchorage rode in Michael Packard's Ford Bronco, Palmer royalty rode in Bill Brown's GTO, and Homer's Don Burt, who is actually the Grand President for the state, was in Tom Cresap's 1925 Model T Ford.

In addition, at the last moment Rondy folks asked us to provide a seat for the Rondy Bear mascot, who ended up in a chair in the bed of David Jensen's 1931 Model A pickup. Carl Godsoe's 1931 Model A pickup gave a ride to Rondy pin designer, Cory Green.

Other cars included Phil Morrow's Model A carrying the club's banner, Bill Brown's Ford Skyliner which carried this year's booster pin designer, Declan Tegge, a fifth grader at Kincaid Elementary School.

Louis Mestier's Ford Thunderbird was in the line and the Weidmers went to a lot of work to provide four cars for the parade: their 1927 Hupmobile, 1952 stake bed Chevy truck, 1949 Ford convertible, and 1941 Cadillac.

This year was a bit more chaotic than previous years with a few last-minute additions, lost participants, and miscommunication between Rondy staff and us. But in the end, just as the parade was starting everything finally came together.

We'd had a decent snowfall overnight prior to the parade and it continued until about the time the parade was half over.

Everyone in the club made it, with David Jensen reporting that getting down from O'Malley Road was a bit nerve

Coordinators Rich Golding and Jim Fredenhagen will have more information regarding hotels and meals by the March 13th meeting.







# Starter Switch Solution



[The following is information condensed from a short article by Jim Cannon. It was submitted by our own Model A guru, Jim Fredenhagen.]

The Model A starter switch consists of a 5/16" rod with a 1" diameter "pedal" on top. It passes through the floorboard and threads into the a rod that activates the electrical switch. It is quite simple, but engine vibration can, and eventually will, cause the rod to completely unscrew and disconnect, sometimes causing a scary and dangerous electrical short.

Jim Cannon suggests you do one of the following to prevent problems out there on the road.

\*Add a small drop of threat locker to the threads when you assemble it.

\*Gently tap the threads with a hammer to deform them.

\*If you are not planning to have your car judged, add a 5/16" jamb nut. Judges won't like this, but it is the best solution.

If you have a Model A, you should make one of these simple alteration right away before you have a serious problem. report.



We were destined to be friends. Ben was born in Anchorage, Alaska the same year as my Big Brother and with the same birthdate as my Little Big Brother. Alaska became a State January 1, 1959 and the next day, the first day for an Alaska Driver's License, Ben was one of the first in line to get his license. This gave him a four- or five-digit license number. By comparison, I got to Alaska in 1978 and I had a seven-digit license number.

Ben worked for Alyeska Pipeline Service Company, and I worked for Alaska National Insurance Company when we met. Many times, we ended up in the same Fairbanks hotel and enjoyed a

few adult beverages in the hotel bar telling jokes, talking cars, and telling lies. Let's just say those bars will never be the same.

His career was always in the oil industry, first in the Cook Inlet Captaining a supply boat, then to the North Slope oil fields, construction of the Trans Alaska Pipeline, and finally a career with Alyeska Pipeline Service Company. I remember him telling me, "I was on the North Slope when there were only two lights. Me and someone else who was lost."

Labor Day weekend of 2014 Neil Noll and I left Alaska on our motorcycles. We had sold our homes and were homeless for a few days. Ben and Lila put us up until we were ready to leave. We really appreciated the hospitality.

Ben and I have kept in touch through FaceBook, emails, and few phone calls. I'll miss Ben's sense of humor and war stories. He could spin a yarn about life experience in Alaska, the oil industry, cars, or whatever. Rest in peace my friend, I'll miss you. Ben was 83 years old.






